3	MR. MICHAEL J. RYAN: And we are in fact
4	broadcasting. My name is Michael Ryan, and today
5	is May 19th and this is the meeting of the Board
6	of Commissioners of Elections. To start the
7	process formally, I will do a roll call.
8	President Taylor?
9	PRESIDENT PATRICIA ANNE TAYLOR: I am
10	here.
11	MR. RYAN: Secretary Umane? Secretary
12	Unmane? Alright, you're muted, Secretary Umane,
13	but I see you. Commissioner Araujo?
14	COMMISSIONER JOSE ARAUJO: Present.
15	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Camilo?
16	Commissioner Camilo?
17	COMMISSIONER MIGUELINA CAMILO: Present.
18	MR. RYAN: Okay. Commissioner Michel is
19	sorry, Commissioner Marmorato?
20	COMMISSIONER GINO MARMORATO: Present.
21	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Michel?
22	COMMISSIONER MICHAEL MICHEL: Present.
23	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Shamoun?
24	COMMISSIONER SIMON SHAMOUN: Present.

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2	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Zaccone?
3	COMMISSIONER JOHN WM. ZACCONE: Present.
4	MR. RYAN: Okay. I'm Michael Ryan. I'm
5	the executive director. Seated to my left is Dawn
6	Sandow, the deputy executive director. Remotely
7	within the building appearing are Pam Perkins,
8	administrative manager and Georgea Kontazmanis,
9	operations manager. Seated at the table before me
10	are Steven Richman, general counsel, Rafael
11	deputy general counsel and appearing remotely for
12	the commissioners' counsels are both Kenneth
13	Moltner and Steven Denkberg. And we have also, a
14	member of staff, Sherwin Suss, the agency chief
15	contracting officer that will be available for
16	any questions on a committee report.
17	So first, we have the borough hours of
18	operations for in person registration for the
19	last night to file for in person registration for
20	the Presidential Primary, federal, state and
21	local primaries on May 29, 2020. My understanding
22	is that staff chiefs and deputies were conferred

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with and for this election, they're recommending that the last night hours be until 9:00 p.m.

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Page 5 1 May 19, 2020 2 under the circumstances and that no hours of operation for the general office, as the 3 4 Manhattan office will be open until 9:00 p.m. Is there any discussion that needs to be had on that 5 particular issue? If there's no discussion and 6 7 the commissioners are prepared to take the recommendation of staff, then a motion is in 8 9 order, Madam President? PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Let me make sure that 10 11 I've got it correct? It's 9:00 p.m. at the 12 headquarters office and each borough office? 13 MR. RYAN: No. Just at each borough 14 office and not at the headquarters. 15 PRESIDENT TAYLOR: And not at the 16 headquarters? 17 MR. RYAN: Correct. 18 PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Okay. Okay. So the 19 motion is that that the borough offices will be 20 open until 9:00 p.m. on May 29, 2020, the last 21 day for persons to register to vote in the 22 President Primary? 23 MR. RYAN: And for the federal, state 24 and local as well, yes.

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2	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: And the state and
3	local.
4	MR. RYAN: Right. Is there a second?
5	SECRETARY UMANE: Second.
6	MR. RYAN: Are there any objections?
7	Hearing none, the motion carries. Commissioners,
8	last week, we provided an update with respect to
9	recalling of staff here at the Board of Elections
10	to prepare for the primary election that's going
11	to be conducted on June 23rd. The staff at each
12	borough has proceeded with the plans that were
13	previously submitted and approved by the borough
14	chiefs and deputies and the reintegration of
15	staff back into the active process and the
16	transition from the work from home footing to
17	coming into the office seems to be working as
18	well as can be expected under the circumstances
19	and just so that we will say publicly, the plans
20	were discussed with, in a conference call between
21	executive management and union management which
22	included the area director of CWA, as well as
23	local representatives within the agency. And all
24	phases of the plan were discussed with the union

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and the union was appreciative of the discourse and the dialogue and felt that the plan that was put in place an effective plan to meet the needs of the agency and the safety and security of the workers.

7 Moving forward, we will remain with an 8 open dialogue between management and union to 9 ensure that the plan as put in place is in fact 10 adhered to and followed by the boroughs. It was 11 recommended and agreed with the union that the 12 first course of action, if there is any deviation 13 from the plan or any concerns that an employ 14 might have is to follow the regular chain of 15 command with the office, supervisor, local management, executive management. And if for some 16 17 reason, an issue would still go unresolved, then 18 it would follow the natural course through union 19 and then have the union advise executive 20 management. We do not anticipate that we should 21 have such issues. They should be able to be resolved expeditiously should anything occur. But 22 23 so far we have nothing to report in that regard. 24 The other issue with respect to the

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planning for this election is the mailing for the absentee ballot applications began yesterday as it is a mailing of slightly over 3.6 million pieces of mail. Clearly, that could not be mailed all at once, and will happen in stages over the next several days and will be completed by Wednesday or Thursday of this week, it should all be completed and we'll get daily reports on how that process has gone.

11 But so far, so good and the mail will 12 begin to drop. The vendor worked on finalizing 13 it over the weekend. And yesterday, I did not 14 get a final report, but yesterday the mailing was 15 scheduled to be between 800,000 and a million 16 pieces to drop yesterday, depending on the work that was completed over the weekend. So that's 17 18 happening, so people should be aware that that 19 mail is coming. We still would encourage people 20 to utilize the website because it will make the 21 back end processing for the Board of Elections 22 easier. But if they choose not to, certainly the 23 paper application process will work as well and 24 we have the resources necessary in place to

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2	handle those pieces of mail as they come back in
3	and we will be able to process them expeditiously
4	for each borough.
5	So that 3.6 million pieces of mail,
6	includes per the executive order, mailings to all
7	voters in jurisdictions where there are contests
8	and it's a primary, it's not a full citywide,
9	although every borough is impacted. It includes
10	inactive voters as well. And that was required by
11	the executive order. And I believe in that 3.6
12	million is about 300,000 inactive voters. So
13	everyone who should be getting an absentee ballot
14	application has been accounted for and will be
15	part of this ongoing mailing process throughout
16	the week.
17	I would also encourage folks who might
18	be listening to this to look out for that mail if
19	they're going to utilize the mail process,
20	complete the application and get it back to us as
21	quickly as possible. The sooner we get them back,
22	the more lead time we'll have in terms of
23	processing the ballot requests and we don't want,
24	for the voter's sake to get this too close to the

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actual day of election, although we'll continue to process by law up to and including the time that we need to. But it's just better for everyone, if you're going to do it, do it quickly and we'll get the ballots out to you quickly and the process will move forward.

So there's an item that is sitting in 8 9 front of me, that I hope is clearly visible. It 10 seems like it is visible on the -- Mr. Savino, 11 would you mind, do me a favor, just for a second, 12 could you just stand behind this, to give a 13 little contrast, so people can see it. So that is 14 a screen that we are recommending and had made a recommendation to the finance committee to 15 16 purchase for all of the poll sites, which will 17 then be the -- okay, Vanna [laughter]. Thank you, 18 Mr. Savino, that we'll purchase for all of the 19 poll sites that will be at each ED, as well as 20 the translator tables and the information tables 21 wherever poll workers would interact with voters 22 the screen would be there.

And we had this prototype made and Ithink it looks pretty visible. If you can see the

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poll pad on the table, the cutout on this prototype was made so that the poll pad could easily fit under the screen and have that interaction with the voter and the poll worker, that sign in interaction be unimpeded.

7 As with all things related to this process, New York City is doing things on a scale 8 9 that's not seen elsewhere in the state, but the 10 recommendation, and Mr. Suss is available for 11 questions if necessary, the recommendation from 12 staff is to purchase 10,000 of these, which would 13 be available at all 1,200 poll sites plus the 14 other 80 or so early voting sites that we have 15 and still have some in reserve in the event that 16 we would need to do that.

17 The cost is \$83 apiece, bringing the 18 purchase to \$830,000 and that would be from ePaul 19 Dynamics, Inc. I will say that several prototypes 20 were evaluated and this one was ultimately 21 chosen. It's made of acrylic, because it's light and easy to assemble and easy then to ship to get 22 23 to the poll sites, and will not create too much 24 difficulty for the poll workers as you really

2	can't see it on the screen, but there are insert
3	legs that are basically a triangle where the
4	screen gets inserted down into those two pieces
5	and stays there.
6	Now, Mr. Suss, can you please briefly
7	discuss the procurement process and the changes
8	to it and why it is permissible for the staff to
9	recommend and ultimately for the commissioners to
10	consider and perhaps proceed with this purchase,
11	given the amount and the recent temporary changes
12	to the procurement rules.
13	MR. SHERWIN SUSS: Yes, commissioners
14	the mayor issued an executive order, number 101,
15	which suspended procurement rules, in particular
16	the procurement policy board rules in regard to
17	dealing with the COVID-19 emergency, as this, Mr.
18	Ryan as pointed out, there's no way to socially
19	distance as per regulations and requirements when
20	a poll worker is interacting with a voter in
21	getting a signature in a poll site. So this would
22	be in response to that.
23	I actually have asked for guidance from
24	the New York City Department of Law over them the

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governor's executive which they had already and the mayor's order, and they -- I have an e-mail from them that this would be an appropriate purchase.

The reason we did that is we could not do a completely sealed bid, which would normally be the process because there's no time left for the bidding process had to have the stipulated time. So with the e-mail from the New York City Law Department saying we're acting appropriately, with the memo I received from the mayor's office of contract services, it's appropriate for us to proceed with this. As Mr. Ryan indicated we did actually solicit five different companies, the prototypes and pricing to find the best model. And actually, this is one of the least expensive ones that we did get.

This is going to be done as a negotiated acquisition under the, so we're following the [unintelligible] [00:17:24] policy board rules, but we don't have to do the competitive sealed bidding process.

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SECRETARY UMANE: The committee voted in

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2	favor of doing this, so I would move the
3	committee report and say that we thought this was
4	pretty nice, pretty workable, and that we thought
5	we needed it for the reasons already stated. So
6	based on that committee report, it needs a motion
7	and a second.
8	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Second.
9	SECRETARY UMANE: But I would call a
10	question.
11	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: So moved.
12	MR. RYAN: And hearing none, no
13	objections
14	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: If I may, I just
15	have one brief question. In determining that this
16	is the best course of action and this is the best
17	available barrier for us to use, are we sure
18	we'll get them in a timely manner?
19	MR. RYAN: That was one of the
20	requirements and that's why we didn't give as
21	much notice as we'd like to, to the finance
22	committee because if we get approval today, and
23	we can tell the contractor today, he assured us
24	that these would be delivered, manufactured and

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2	processed and delivered, so they can be sent out
3	for early voting sites and election day.
4	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Thank you for
5	that. That was my one [unintelligible]
6	[00:18:46].
7	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: What was the
8	number purchased?
9	MR. RYAN: Pardon, Commissioner Shamoun?
10	SECRETARY UMANE: Ten thousand, ten
11	thousand.
12	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Ten thousand, so
13	get one for each point of interaction? The
14	tables, the info tables?
15	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Translators.
16	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.
17	COMMISSIONER CAMILO: One for every
18	MR. RYAN: Anywhere where the public and
19	the poll workers would have to interact.
20	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.
21	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Camilo, did you
22	have a question?
23	COMMISSIONER CAMILO: No, I was just,
24	from our committee discussion, we asked that

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2	question and it was, we're estimating on per
3	every ED, per every point of contact, just like
4	Commissioner Shamoun was restating.
5	MR. RYAN: Okay. Anyone else? So the
6	question was called, it was seconded by
7	Commissioner Taylor, there appearing no
8	objections, we'll move forward with this purchase
9	as stated by Mr. Suss. Now, the other, we don't
10	need a motion on that right, because it's a
11	committee report?
12	MR. RICHMAN: Committee report,
13	[unintelligible] [00:19:52].
14	MR. RYAN: Right. So the committee
15	report is adopted. The reason I moved down here
16	as well, was just to make one more point. Next to
17	the acrylic was a basket of pens. What we did to
18	ensure that there would be to minimize
19	potential cross contamination at the poll sites
20	with people interacting, we bought a disposable
21	pen that will be given to each voter and it also
22	is a stylus, so we will not be using the reusable
23	stylus that we used for the poll pads in the last
24	election. The voters will take this pen. It will

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2	act as their stylus so they can sign in, and then
3	when they go to the privacy booth, it also can be
4	clicked open for a pen and they can use that for
5	their ballot so that they won't have to use the
6	tethered pens at the privacy booths. And this
7	will be another way to ensure the safety of the
8	poll workers and the voters as well, so that they
9	can take that pen with them when they leave and
10	it'll be theirs. Alright. I'm going to go back
11	MR. RICHMAN: [unintelligible]
12	[00:21:10].
13	MR. RYAN: [unintelligible] [00:21:12]
14	[laughter] I don't remember off the top of my
15	head, but it's a lot of pens. Now, that concludes
16	the formal agenda, but I believe that the
17	commissioners would like a brief rundown of the
18	most recent matters of litigation. Right, it's
19	all public. So, there is some litigation to
20	discuss, but everything that we need to discuss
21	is otherwise public information so we can move
22	forward with that.
23	MR. RICHMAN: Commissioners, this
24	morning, just so you're aware, the U.S. Second

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Circuit Court of Appeals in a unanimous decision affirmed the district court's decision requiring the conduct of the Democratic Presidential Primary on June 23rd. Commissioners Spano and Kellner have indicated they will not seek a Supreme Court review, so the primary is on.

This morning, as well, the Appellate Division considered the applications for leave to appeal -- the Court of Appeals, I should say, considered leave to appeal from the Appellate Divisions and we have five matters that the court has agreed to entertain.

14 The first is, relates Ferreyra against 15 Arroyo. It's a challenge to Candidate Arroyo's 16 designating petitions for member of the Assembly. They also granted leave to appeal in the three 17 18 cover sheet review cases in the Matter of Naheer 19 [phonetic] against the Board, Mujaddid [phonetic] 20 v. the Board, and Seawright against the Board. 21 And they also granted leave to appeal for a Third 22 Department case, Hiwathmith [phonetic] against 23 the State Board of Elections. This involves a 24 late mailed certificate of acceptance.

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2	They denied all the other requests for
3	leave to appeal, which includes the two cases
4	related to the 37th City Council District and the
5	number of signatures required to qualify for the
6	ballot. It includes the case in, two Richmond
7	County cases, the Parascando case against Monheit
8	63rd AD Conservative Party. The motion for leave
9	to appeal was dismissed upon the grounds that the
10	order sought to be appealed from does not
11	determine the proceedings finally. This is where
12	the Appellate Division sent the matter back for a
13	line by line review by the Supreme Court and then
14	the petitioner in the case declined to go
15	forward.
16	They denied leave for appeal in the
17	Matter of Quart against Kaufman. The residency
18	issue, Mr. Kaufman remains on the ballot. They
19	declined leave to appeal in Robleto against
20	Gowda, so the candidate Gowda remains on the
21	ballot for the State Senate seat in Brooklyn and
22	Staten Island, the 23rd District. And the other
23	cases relate to cases outside the City of New
24	York.

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2	And finally, this morning, the Appellate
3	Division, Second Department heard the third
4	appeal relating to the 37th City Council
5	District, the manner of Echevarria against the
6	Board, oral argument went well, and this is the
7	case where the Supreme Court ruled back on April
8	30th. Rather than originally appeal to the
9	Appellate Division, the parties sought review in
10	federal court. The federal court said that there
11	is no [unintelligible] [00:24:43] federal claim
12	and so last minute, they went to the Second
13	Department. The Second Department did not appear
14	at least to be pleased with the idea that they
15	became the second choice for relief and so we'll
16	expect a decision from the Second Department
17	either later today or tomorrow.
18	And then the only other matter pending

And then the only other matter pending is the request to conduct the application to audit the conduct of the Queens borough president special election was denied by Supreme Court. The petitioner in that meeting, Mr. Quinn, filed a notice of appeal last night and this morning filed a request for a temporary restraining order

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from the Appellate Division to mandate us to conduct the special election. We're waiting for a response from the Appellate Division. Your executive committee has already authorized us to oppose such a relief matter. And if you read the decision that was circulated, one of the key factors Queens cited was the lateness of this attempt and the potential adverse impact it could have on all the voters of Queens. So we'll see what happens. Right now, the Appellate Division has scheduled oral argument on the appeal itself for next Tuesday morning. I think that's litigation up until the last 15 minutes.

15 MR. RYAN: Alright. So that concludes the litigation matters that are pending, or 16 17 recently decided. And the executive management 18 does not have any manners for the commissioners 19 to consider in executive session. So the last 20 question then is there a motion to go into 21 executive session for commissioner related 22 matters or is there a motion to adjourn? 23 COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Or --24 COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: No, I'd like

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2	executive session.
З	MR. RYAN: Okay. Is there a second to go
4	into executive session.
5	SECRETARY UMANE: Second.
6	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Second.
7	MR. RYAN: Is
8	SECRETARY UMANE: You should say if it's
9	for personnel or litigation.
10	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Litigation.
11	MR. RYAN: Okay. So there's a motion
12	for, to go into executive session for litigation,
13	and I believe there was a well, we'd have to
14	re-second it, I guess, Commissioner Michel is
15	seconding it. Is there any objections? Hearing
16	none, the motion carries and if, assuming that
17	there is nothing to report, I will come back
18	down, so perhaps we can agree on the next meeting
19	date and have that motion be done now, so we can
20	simply make the announcement post executive
21	session. Today's the 19th, so the next meeting
22	would otherwise be the 26th of May, keeping in
23	mind, that is the day after the Memorial Day
24	holiday. So the question I think the

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2	commissioners have to entertain is do we want to
3	have a meeting the first day back from the
4	holiday or not.
5	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Where we going?
6	[laughter]
7	SECRETARY UMANE: Yeah, we should. We
8	should.
9	MR. RYAN: Okay. So then is there a
10	motion to set the meeting for next Tuesday?
11	SECRETARY UMANE: So moved.
12	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Seconded.
13	MR. RYAN: Okay. Any objections? Hearing
14	none, the motion carries. Okay. So, executive
15	session it is.
