3	MR. MICHAEL J. RYAN: Okay. We are live.
4	Today is June 2nd, it's the regular weekly
5	meeting of the Board of Commissioners. I will
6	start off with the roll call for the
7	commissioners. President Taylor? President
8	Taylor?
9	PRESIDENT PATRICIA ANNE TAYLOR: I am
10	present.
11	MR. RYAN: Okay. Secretary Umane?
12	SECRETARY FREDERIC UMANE: Here.
13	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Araujo?
14	COMMISSIONER JOSE ARAUJO: Here.
15	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Camilo?
16	COMMISSIONER MIGUELINA CAMILO: Here.
17	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Marmorato?
18	COMMISSIONER GINO MARMORATO: Here.
19	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Michel?
20	COMMISSIONER MICHAEL MICHEL: Here.
21	MR. RYAN: I believe Commissioner
22	Shamoun was going to be joining us momentarily,
23	so we'll hold off on him. Commissioner Townsend?
24	COMMISSIONER TIFFANY TOWNSEND: Present.

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2	MR. RYAN: And Commissioner Zaccone?
3	COMMISSIONER JOHN WM. ZACCONE: Present.
4	MR. RYAN: Okay. That so we have a
5	quorum. I am Michael Ryan, I'm the executive
6	director. Seated to my right is, my left, I'm
7	sorry, is Dawn Sandow, the deputy executive
8	director. Appearing remotely within the building
9	is operations manager Georgea Kontazmanis. So
10	that I don't forget, I will move to
11	commissioners' counsel, both Mr. Moltner and Mr.
12	Denkberg are appearing remotely as well, and
13	seated in front of me are general counsel, Steven
14	Richman, deputy general counsel Rafael Savino,
15	and the agency chief contracting officer, Sherwin
16	Suss.
17	So Item IA on the agenda, we also added
18	1B, which is a finance committee report. In
19	general, we are moving forward with elections
20	preparations. We are continuing to process
21	absentee ballot applications as they come in and
22	that mailer is going out that mailings are
23	going out on a daily basis.
24	Neither vendor has had difficulty

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keeping up with the volume that's coming in, so that's a good thing. The staffs are, the borough staffs are continuing to work those queues and process that data and the ballots are going out regularly.

Anecdotally, I have had conversations with individual who have already received their absentee ballots, so that process appears to be functioning well. And considering how quickly that we had to spin that up, that's a good thing. Like everything else we do in elections, it requires constant monitoring and diligence as the work comes in. But thus far, we have been able to keep up with the process and we're not anticipating that changing moving forward.

So we are, the boroughs are still 17 18 working with their elections preparation and the 19 testing process is underway and we expect, as we 20 always are, that we will be ready for the 21 election. We have early voting is starting in a 22 week and a half or so, on June 13th. And the 23 staff is working diligently with respect to those 24 preparations.

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2	I will, before we get to the finance
3	committee, I don't believe that there is any, but
4	I'll ask, for the purposes of the public record,
5	are there any further updates with respect to
6	litigation that needs to be reported to the
7	commissioners?
8	MR. RICHMAN: Commissioners, just for
9	your information, the Second Circuit Court of
10	Appeals will hear arguments on Friday morning at
11	10:00 a.m. on the application of Victor Jordan to
12	be added to the ballot. It's available on their
13	website if anybody wants to watch.
14	And the two other pending items that the
15	executive committee authorized appearances, an
16	appeal by Craig Schley in the 70th AD Democratic
17	Primary, his removal from the ballot. The notice
18	of appeal has been filed, but the First
19	Department hasn't scheduled the argument.
20	And then in the Second Department,
21	Everly Brown filed a notice of appeal, but his
22	counsel today announced he was withdrawing due to
23	illness, so again, we have nothing scheduled and
24	the Second Department, it should be noted, did

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2	accept the Board's affirmation in the special
3	election case that it is almost it is
4	impossible at this time to change the ballot and
5	implement it in a lawful manner. So I think at
6	least on the state court level, we're okay.
7	SECRETARY UMANE: I have a question. My
8	understanding is that the Manhattan Borough
9	office has been getting pushback in connection
10	with the utilization of poll sites on election
11	day, not early voting, and that they were
12	scrambling around trying to find alternative
13	sites. And I was wondering if we're just blessed
14	with this problem or whether it's something that
15	has been coming up throughout the city. This is
16	probably mostly related to COVID and locations
17	not wanting to open it up to their locations,
18	opening them up to outsiders. So I'm not sure if
19	others are experiencing the same problems, but
20	it's a little bit of a concern for the chief and
21	deputy as well as the commissioners here in
22	Manhattan.
23	MR RICHMAN. Commissioner we've been

23 MR. RICHMAN: Commissioner, we've been 24 approached by borough staff in two other boroughs

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where there are potential problems. We've sought to intervene, and in some cases where we have been unsuccessful, the chief and the deputy will be approaching the borough commissioners' committee.

7 The Law Department is prepared to go in to seek to compel the use of the facilities, but 8 9 I have not heard anything with respect to, and 10 Mr. Savino, you haven't, we haven't heard from 11 Manhattan that they've had specific site 12 difficulties. So if you want, we'll reach out to 13 them and ask them to at least let us know so we 14 can get the Law Department up to speed about 15 potentials.

SECRETARY UMANE: Yeah, I made a point of saying that they should contact executive management and legal. And they tend to listen in on this, so I think we're getting the point across that they need to reach out to you guys as well as to executive management to try and get help --

23MR. RYAN: So I can say --24SECRETARY UMANE: -- to see what we can

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2	do rather, and approach it on a two track basis,
3	one to see if there's a way of getting their
4	cooperation at existing sites, and then
5	alternatively looking around for other sites.
6	And I was also told that it may be
7	easier this time around to be able to move sites
8	because the testing on the machines was being
9	done on a broader basis so that machines at
10	adjoining sites might be able to handle transfers
11	a lot easier than they have been in the past and
12	that they were doing it based on early voting
13	sites rather than sole site that it had been done
14	on to facilitate last minute moves.
15	The problem with that I guess is it
16	increases the number and amount and degree of
17	testing that has to go into each machine which
18	lengthens the process. And with the, and we're
19	suffering, along with everybody else in New York
20	City, with the curfews, because we need to close
21	the office earlier than otherwise, because of
22	curfews and we have been expecting to be able to
23	work through to 11:00 o'clock and tonight, at
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least, and now last night, they had the curfew,

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2	we had to let people out early and tonight, it's
3	8:00 o'clock in the city, so that our people
4	would have to be let out at say, 7:00 o'clock,
5	rather than 11:00 o'clock. So times the office
6	that's four hours worth of testing work that
7	could have been done that can't be done.
8	But I'm just letting some people know
9	that's what's going on in Manhattan and that
10	there may be comparable issues elsewhere.
11	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: There definitely are
12	very similar issues in Brooklyn. We've had a
13	number of sites that are not wanting to be used
14	as a poll site, but most of them have been senior
15	residences. And the chief and deputies have
16	allocated the applicable EDs to mostly I believe
17	nearby schools.
18	MS. SANDOW: Yes, Brooklyn has done
19	that.
20	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: So they seem to have
21	public schools.
22	MS. SANDOW: They've changed some of
23	their EDs and that was all done, the
24	[unintelligible] [00:19:05] are done and

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2	everything is in the system for Brooklyn.
3	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Right. So, that part
4	of it is not so much of a problem as the testing
5	part because also Brooklyn has been having to
6	close early. And I haven't had a chance to speak
7	with them yet about what they think they might be
8	able to do to compensate for the fact that
9	they're not having as many testing hours
10	available, but if anyone has any thoughts on that
11	I would certainly be interested to hear.
12	MR. RYAN: So, if I could just jump in,
13	I would like to recognize that during this
14	discourse, Commissioner Shamoun has joined the
15	meeting.
16	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Good, right on time.
17	MS. SANDOW: And can I also add that we
18	have spoken to every chief and deputy earlier
19	today and we do have a plan of operation for the
20	remainder of the week so that we can maintain our
21	current testing regiment.
22	MR. RYAN: And now, Commissioner Umane,
23	getting back to your point, I would like to point
24	out that I did have several conversations with
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2	the Manhattan chief over the weekend about an
3	issue separate and apart for this that required -
4	_
5	SECRETARY UMANE: No, that was a COVID
6	issue, yeah.
7	MR. RYAN: Right, that, that required
8	attention.
9	SECRETARY UMANE: No, they
10	MR. RYAN: What, what, what I would like
11	to add is while there may be, I cannot attest to
12	the fact that there's no e-mail sitting in my e-
13	mail box, inbox, with respect to this issue, I
14	can say that no one has picked up the phone and
15	said that this is an urgent matter requiring
16	immediate attention. So when that doesn't happen,
17	executive management takes the position that
18	things are moving along with the understanding
19	that we are in a completely different environment
20	than we've ever been in before, and that there's
21	going to be adjustments to the process as we move
22	along on a case by case basis.
23	So everyone needs to, as I have been
24	saying for months now, relax into the chaos. This

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2	is not a normal time for anyone and we're going
3	to have to just do our best to make adjustments
4	to the process as it moves forward. And that's
5	where we're at. And this curfew issue certainly
6	presents another moment of adjustment. But
7	there's been a lot of those moments over the last
8	three months.
9	SECRETARY UMANE: Oh, no doubt. And my
10	point in doing it now is so to see, alert the
11	other commissioners to potential issues, because
12	what applies to Manhattan usually applies to
13	everybody.
14	MR. RYAN: Yeah.
15	SECRETARY UMANE: And in case they
16	didn't notify you, I just did. So
17	MR. RYAN: I appreciate it. I just was
18	clarifying the record, counselor.
19	SECRETARY UMANE: I wasn't, yeah.
20	MR. RYAN: Yes. Alright. So, that's what
21	I have by way of election updates. I'm prepared
22	to move to the finance committee report if that's
23	okay, unless there are any commissioners that
24	require anything further. I'll take a moment and

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2	allow someone to step up if they want to say
3	something. Okay, hearing no one, we'll move on to
4	the oh, go ahead.
5	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Sorry, Director
6	Ryan. This is John Zaccone. I just wanted to make
7	a point, I do have something for the executive
8	session later.
9	MR. RYAN: Yes, and others do as well.
10	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Thank you.
11	MS. SANDOW: Personnel.
12	MR. RYAN: Yeah, so personnel matters
13	that have come up. So I think we have a unanimous
14	committee recommendations on the one, two, three,
15	four, five items that were put before the finance
16	committee today.
17	The first item is a not to exceed, to
18	raise the ceiling of the Eiseman Levine lawsuit,
19	the Eiseman Levine counsel to the lawsuit
20	involving the translators and the ceiling on that
21	requires a raise of an additional \$130,500. And
22	that was approved unanimously.
23	I'm prepared to go down each item and
24	then take a vote at the end, unless Madam

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2	President and Secretary Umane, if you think we
3	should vote on them individually?
4	SECRETARY UMANE: Yeah, maybe that makes
5	the most sense.
6	MR. RYAN: Okay.
7	SECRETARY UMANE: Although it takes
8	longer, but maybe it would make sense.
9	MR. RYAN: Fine.
10	SECRETARY UMANE: So, the committee
11	recommended this and so we put it to the
12	commissioners. This is to be reviewed by both the
13	general, the in-house counsel at the Board and
14	the commissioners' finance committee. And it's,
15	so that we will be reviewing these bills on a
16	going forward basis, and it's an up to \$130,500
17	fee. And I've had a discussion with the
18	relationship partner at the firm regarding this,
19	and he understands that there's going to be
20	greater scrutiny on these bills, but that this is
21	a budget and we can approve the budget, but we're
22	not necessarily approving an individual bill at
23	this point. The prior bill was the prior
24	budget was exceeded in the amount of 230,000 but

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2	that's been billed and paid, but going forward
3	for the appeal to the second department, the
4	budget is 130 but it's going to be reviewed. Each
5	of the bills are going to be reviewed by both ou
6	counsels and by the finance committee.
7	MR. RYAN: Right. So, ordinarily
8	speaking, when the commissioners give approval
9	for a contract amount, then the individual
10	contract managers, in this case, that would be
11	the legal department, would review the invoice
12	and then submit that invoice to our electronic
13	pardon?
14	SECRETARY UMANE: [unintelligible]
15	[00:25:43]
16	MR. RYAN: Uh, they would submit it
17	through the electronic system, which essentially
18	is a payment approval process that would come to
19	executive management. Under these circumstances,
20	Mr. Richman and Mr. Savino, the commissioners are
21	directing that you will submit the e-mail that
22	you have reviewed the invoice, executive will
23	then forward that invoice to the finance
24	committee and upon finance committee approval,

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2	you will then have the authorization to complete
3	the process through the electronic payment
4	process. Okay. so it's just, it's adding another
5	layer of review preliminarily by the
6	commissioners. Alright. So, with that backdrop
7	now complete, I suppose Commissioner Umane, are
8	you suggesting we do a roll call for each one of
9	these?
10	SECRETARY UMANE: Well, yeah, but do the
11	negative roll call, because it's faster, if
12	anybody objects.
13	MR. RYAN: Okay. So this was a unanimous
14	committee recommendation. Are there are any
15	objections? So I'm sorry, do we have to do a
16	motion to accept?
17	MR. RICHMAN: No, it's a committee
18	report, so it's already been moved and seconded
19	by the members of the committee.
20	MR. RYAN: Right.
21	MR. RICHMAN: So the only question now
22	is recording negative votes if any.
23	MR. RYAN: Okay. Are there any
24	commissioners who would object to moving forward

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2	on the Eiseman Levine contract? Hearing no
3	objections, that is approved by the
4	commissioners.
5	N-Tier [phonetic] is our vendor that
6	essentially handles all things develop related to
7	the voter registration system. And I can tell you
8	just briefly, that a lot has been added to the
9	voter registration system by way of litigation
10	and by way of executive order and legislative
11	process over the course of time. So we are asking
12	that the N-Tier contract ceiling be raised from
13	now until the end of December 2021, so

16	MR. RYAN: for the ceiling to be
17	increased to cover all of the things associated
18	with maintaining and upgrading the system and
19	that was also a unanimous approval of the finance
20	committee. So, are there any objections to said
21	approval? Hearing none, that motion carries.
22	Quality Facilities Solutions, this is a
23	matter that is purely COVID-19 related. And we
24	have early voting sites that we will have people

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2 going in and out of for nine consecutive days, and early on in this confirmation process, sites 3 4 were expressing concerns about cleaning the 5 facilities on a regular basis after use, so that their facilities would remain COVID free. And the 6 7 [unintelligible] [00:01:06] Department worked with the Department of Citywide Administrative 8 9 Services, and we're recommending a total of 10 \$361,755.90 for Quality Facility Solutions that 11 would provide cleaning services for all of the 12 early voting sites that will be utilized for the 13 June primary season. And that was also a 14 unanimous recommendation from the finance 15 committee, so are there any objections? 16 SECRETARY UMANE: I just wanted to say 17 for the record that this is based on the square 18 footage of each of the poll places and that it 19 was done with the city, reinforce that it was 20 done with the city contract. 21 MR. RYAN: Yes. 22 SECRETARY UMANE: So, it is what it is, 23 and we need to do it.

MR. RYAN: Alright. So it was unanimous

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2	and are there any objections? Hearing none, that
3	contract is approved. And that leaves us now to
4	the last item on the agenda. And that would be
5	for the purchase of 65,000 cloth masks that
6	instead of being disposable, would be reusable
7	and the purchase of those masks from Evergreen
8	would be \$195,000. It appears as if the mask
9	situation, as I'm calling it, will last for the
10	foreseeable future, and that ultimately for the
11	staff and for the poll workers, providing a
12	reusable mask with a higher price point at least
13	initially will no longer be a consumable item and
14	then it will end up at the end of this process
15	being fiscally favorable to the city to use
16	reusable equipment as opposed to disposable
17	equipment. And this also ended up being a
18	unanimous recommendation from the finance
19	committee. So, are there any objections? Hearing
20	none, the motion carries, so Evergreen is
21	approved as well.
22	And then there are items for personnel
23	in executive session. As Mr. Richman has
24	previously reported on the litigation matters,

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2	there is nothing further to discuss by way of
3	litigation. Is there a motion to go into
4	executive session?
5	SECRETARY UMANE: So moved, for
6	personnel.
7	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Seconded.
8	MR. RYAN: Oh, and I apologize. I think
9	Mr. Richman is correct. He's reminding me that we
10	should set the meeting date for next week so that
11	we can just announce the results of executive
12	session after that's completed.
13	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: June 9th.
14	MR. RYAN: So today's the 2nd, so June
15	9th would be the date. So June 9th at 1:30 will
16	be the next meeting and then we're already moved
17	to go into executive session, so alright
18	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you.
19	MR. RYAN: we'll go upstairs, and
20	then we'll take care of executive session and
21	then I'll be back.
22	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you, Mr. Ryan.
23	MR. RYAN: Alright. Thank you.
