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2	(The meeting commenced at 1:14 p.m.)
3	MR. MICHAEL J. RYAN: Okay. We're back
4	live, and Commissioner Taylor, President Taylor
5	and Secretary Umane, prior to the start of the
6	meeting, wish to be recognized.
7	PRESIDENT PATRICIA ANNE TAYLOR: Yes.
8	MR. RYAN: So please proceed.
9	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you so much.
10	This is Commissioner Taylor speaking. I simply
11	wanted to reach out to all of our staff,
12	coworkers, early voting coordinators, and just
13	thank them for the wonderful job that they have
14	been doing so far under early voting. And we
15	appreciate their cooperation, we appreciate their
16	doing this in this really distressing time of
17	COVID-19 and we do really, really appreciate the
18	fact that they've been carrying on very well,
19	working very well together and that our
20	coordinators and our early voting chief advisors
21	have been going out, investing time, so thank
22	you.
23	SECRETARY FREDERIC UMANE: Yeah, I'd
24	just like to really reiterate that and say thank

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2 you to all the people who have been participating in the early voting, in the processing of the 3 tremendous quantities of absentee ballots and to 4 5 thank all of the poll workers, our staff and everyone that's been out there busting their 6 7 chops to try and put this primary on under really horrific circumstances. So, thank you all for 8 9 your hard work and diligence, and it's great in 10 the way that you're helping our democracy, so 11 thank you very much.

12 MR. RYAN: Thank you, commissioners. 13 And if I might add the adjustments that this 14 agency has had to make with respect to COVID-19 15 has caused us to operate different from the way 16 that we normally would and without necessarily 17 the full complement of staff at a given moment in 18 time, although we've made some scheduling 19 arrangements to accommodate that. And I will say 20 that especially to the remainder of executive 21 staff, Ms. Sandow, Ms. Kontazmanis in particular, 22 as well as the bureau chiefs and deputies, the 23 stress that we're all under, and the manner in 24 which we're performing while under that stress is

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truly remarkable.

And as we sit here today, we are in the 3 fourth day of the election already, believe it or 4 5 not. We had early voting Saturday, Sunday, Monday and it's underway now. So I'll give a report on 6 7 the check-ins to date, which would be close of business yesterday, so through day three, we had 8 9 2,337 in Manhattan, 1,810 in the Bronx, 3,129 in 10 Brooklyn, 2,419 in Queens and 702 in Staten 11 Island, keeping in mind that not every election 12 district has a contest citywide. So that totals 13 10,397 check-ins which, of course, remains unofficial until the election is certified. 14 15 I would like to move on to a little 16 brief recitation of where we came from and where 17 we are with respect to the absentee ballot 18 process and the adjustments that had to be made 19 associated with this election. 20 We were aware as in the lead up to this 21 election that changes were going to be made. We

could, to keep us apprised of what might be coming. And in anticipation of that, the Board

were kept in the loop as best as the State Board

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made its absentee ballot application portal for this election live and we received, it went live late in the day on 4/27, but we actually did receive applications through that process on April 27th.

7 The original decision to restore the additional presidential candidates and delegates 8 9 to the ballot came from the federal court on May 10 5th, but it wasn't until May 19th that the 11 Appellate Court decided the appeal of the State 12 Board of Elections. So in reality, the ballot was 13 not finalized, at least on the presidential side 14 of things until May 19th, which then of course 15 caused some jurisdictions to have a two page, most of the jurisdictions to have a two page 16 17 ballot, on comprising of the presidential 18 candidates, all ten of them, plus their slates of 19 delegates, and then the other for the local, 20 state and local races that might be on their 21 ballots.

22 So, the first ballots were mailed out on 23 May 26th. And that has been on a rolling basis 24 from May 26th moving forward, as they come in. To

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2 date, the Board has processed over 550,000 ballots mailed out to voters. To give a little 3 perspective on that, four years ago, for this 4 same election, we processed about 65,000 absentee 5 ballot applications. And four years ago for the 6 presidential election coming up in November, we 7 proceeded 144,000. And to date, and we're not 8 9 finished yet, it's already over 550.

10 As I said, these are processes on a 11 rolling basis, as are the receipt of the absentee 12 ballot applications. This was done at a very 13 compressed timeframe. We are anticipating that 14 we're going to get quite a number of absentee 15 ballot applications right up to the deadline, 16 which the deadline for postmarking is today, 17 however it's not, that's not the deadline for the 18 receipt. So, as this week plays out, we will 19 continue to process the absentee ballot 20 applications that are received and we have plans 21 in place to be able to process all of those 22 absentee ballot applications to ensure that the 23 voters receive them in a timely manner to be able 24 to vote.

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2 Of course, we do and must rely on the United States Post Office to complete its mission 3 4 once we get our work done and, and, and we get 5 them out. I will tell you that our vendor partners have been doing yeomen's work and 6 7 working around the clock to assist us in this regard, as, as well as having made adjustment 8 9 toward the backend of the process, which we 10 anticipated. They are delivering the ballots once 11 completed, to a post office, a specific post 12 office working in cooperation with the United 13 States Post Office to a location in Manhattan, so 14 that we have a centralized processing unit. So 15 the vendor is taking on some of the 16 responsibility of the delivery of the ballots by 17 getting from Albany and Rochester respectively to 18 New York City.

And the post office has indicated that that will assist them tremendously because it will eliminate probably several steps in their process. So they won't have to go to staging locations. It'll go to one location in New York City and then right out to the five boroughs. So

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2	that's going to be a big help.
3	It was quite a bit of conversation at
4	the beginning of this process about telephone
5	applications. I will say that as of last night,
6	we had received less than 2,000 telephone
7	applications total. So although there was quite a
8	bit of talk about it, it didn't really
9	materialize into large numbers. But it was there
10	for, as an option, as required by the executive
11	order.
12	And I would just like to conclude with
13	the applications pursuant to the executive order,
14	were mailed out May 18th through May 21st, and
15	that was as quickly as we could get them out,
16	keeping in mind that there were some discussions
17	at the executive level in Albany with respect to
18	potential changes to the application itself.
19	Those changes did not materialize. But there was
20	also discussions with respect to changes to the
21	instructions that had to be included with the
22	applications. And although we were ready to mail
23	out the applications earlier, we were advised by
24	the State Board of Elections to stand down and

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wait until the remainder of that process completed itself, and so it did create a little bit more time pressure, both in terms of processing the mailing itself, but also on the backend. But we are doing, making tremendous efforts to have all of those process -- and we believe, not we believe, we know that every one of those applications will be processed and every one will be mailed an absentee ballot.

11 That said, because there were multiple 12 options for voters to choose from, a telephone, 13 the portal, an e-mail and then the paper ballot, 14 one of the steps that we've had to take is to 15 have our tech folks compare each of those sources 16 to ensure that we weren't processing someone's request more than once. So, for example, the most 17 18 common one would be that somebody went through 19 the portal and then mailed in the paper 20 application once they got it, not necessarily 21 sure what the right thing to do was.

22 So we're scrubbing those lists, one 23 against the other, to make certain that if 24 something was processed already that they, that

2	it wasn't processed twice and that adds a little	
3	bit of an extra step to it, but it also	
4	eliminates confusion and it's necessary to do.	
5	The other thing I will say is that our	
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	Avid vendor partner [unintelligible] [00:26:09]	
7	has developed a tool for our staff to be able to,	
8	upon inquiry, access Avid and in the Avid system	
9	there is now a ballot button where you can click	
10	on the ballot button in an individual voter's	
11	record to say when their application was	
12	received, and if the application has not been	
13	mailed out, it would simply say application	
14	received on this date and if the application was	
15	mailed out, it's in the system that we're able to	
16	advise the voter that it's mailed out and that	
17	it's on its way. And that has enabled	
18	particularly, I'm going to say probably more	
19	younger people or at least those people that are	
20	actively involved in Twitter even if they're not	
21	young, that seems to be where we're getting a lot	
22	of the inquiries like on the where is my ballot	
23	inquiry. And we have gotten tremendously	
24	positive feedback with respect to our ability to	

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respond to those, that form of social media inquiry and we're able to tell them it was mailed on this specific or we received your application and it's in the process. And that really has been good.

MS. SANDOW: Accessible ballots?

MR. RYAN: So, yeah, that was, I mean if you have something on the accessible ballots because that wasn't a process that I was directly involved in, but Ms. Sandow I think is going to say a few words about the lawsuit that was settled and the accessible ballots that we have to provide as a settlement of that lawsuit to members of the accessibility community.

MS. SANDOW: Our ADA coordinator, Ms. 16 17 Ariel Marco is working directly on this task. 18 They will apply to e-mail, an address is set up. 19 We partnered with Democracy Live, a vendor who is 20 converting all ballots. We're up to date. We have 21 received probably maybe about over 25 22 applications for accessible ballots and we are to 23 date as far as mailing out the envelopes and 24 emailing back the ballots to the voters. So we're

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perfect on that end.

MR. RYAN: Very good. And the last thing 3 4 that I would like to mention, which is a post election issue, I'm anticipating, I could be 5 wrong, but it will be up to the commissioners, 6 7 but I'm anticipating that we won't be having a meeting next Tuesday since it's election day so I 8 9 want to mention it now. There's a lot of talk about when are we 10 11 going to have results after the election is 12 concluded. So it's very simple, conceptually. 13 Complex, in terms of process, but the same 14 process that exists for paper for elections prior 15 to now will exist for paper when we process them 16 post election, so this is not as simple as seven days past after the election, we open envelopes, 17 18 we feed the ballots into, you know, into high 19 speed scanners and they spit out results at the 20 back end. 21 They still have to go through the 22

validation process, which the only way to do that ultimately is a manual process. The same way that the signature is the gateway to the ballot at the

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2	poll site, the signature is the gateway to the	
3	validation of the ballot in a paper scenario.	
4	In addition to that, campaigns and	
5	candidates can have watchers at the, at this	
6	process. It's open, it's otherwise open to the	
7	public and specific watchers can be designated to	
8	make objections. If we get very few objections,	
9	then the process pick up speed. And if we get a	
10	tremendous number of objections, then the process	
11	will slow down.	
12	I will tell you that in the almost seven	
13	years that I have been here, we have been	
14	uniformly praised for our paper process and the	
15	accuracy with which we do things. So, we're going	
16	to continue along those paths and follow the	
17	methods that we have employed in the past, albeit	
18	this go round with a greater volume of paper. So	
19	folks are going to have to be patient at the	
20	backend. And I believe Mr. Richman would like to	
21	add something. I lost my ability to read his	
22	lips, so I'm going to allow him to make some	
23	further clarification.	
24	MR. RICHMAN: Commissioners, I think	

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2 what the public should be aware and the candidates, that in addition to the standard 3 procedures we have, we also are going to be 4 5 observing the required of personal protective equipment and social distancing. So we will not 6 7 be able to accommodate as many tables as we've done in the past at the others in the locations. 8 9 Some contests have seven, eight, nine candidates. 10 They all have a right to have a representative 11 there, and in some cases, a given ED may have a 12 contest for Congress, Senate and Assembly, we 13 could end up with 15 or 20 watchers at a given 14 table. So how we're going to organize that, I 15 know the chiefs and deputies are thinking of it. 16 MS. KONTAZMANIS: Mr. Richman, we 17 actually have an operational meeting for that 18 tomorrow and we'll be putting something out, sir. 19

MR. RICHMAN: Perfect. Again, that will not exactly speed the process along to make that go forward and that's something that we've got to be aware, as well as the right, if we have to make copies of the ballot envelopes, if we have a large number, it's going to take a longer time to

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make those copies for each candidate.

MR. RYAN: Right. And the other thing as well, keep in mind that there are quite a few cross county contests which then will require some coordination with the individual campaigns if they have a want or a need to have potential watchers in two counties. And sometimes, they can't do it simultaneously. And at the end of if, the most important thing is not that we adhere to some rigid administrative rule, but rather that we have results that are impervious to challenge at the end because everyone was treated fairly.

14 So in the past, we've made some 15 scheduling adjustments of opening certain 16 Assembly Districts or Election Districts because 17 watchers could not clone themselves and be 18 present in borough A at the same time that they 19 needed to be present in borough B. So that's 20 another little scheduling wrinkle that we'll have 21 to accommodate.

The answer is we'll get it all done. And we'll get it all done accurately and in an organized way. But we're going to be doing it at

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2	a volume that we haven't, we haven't experienced	
3	before. So everybody needs to be patient, and as	
4	I have been wont to say with some of these	
5	things, it will not be add water and stir. It's	
6	going to take some time and we cannot suspend the	
7	time space continuum to accomplish the whims of	
8	the writ of politic.	
9	MR. RICHMAN: [unintelligible]

13	election day is a week away, we still have one	
14	candidate who has not yet exhausted all potential

17	MR. RICHMAN: Commissioners, you should	
18	have received yesterday, we received two	
19	decisions, one from the Second Circuit Court of	
20	Appeals affirming the District Court's denial of	
21	Victor Jordan's attempt to be added to the ballot	
21 22	Victor Jordan's attempt to be added to the ballot in Brooklyn for State Senate and Democratic	

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able to show in any way that the Board acted improperly and that his petitions were filed late and citing the Seawright case at the Court of Appeals, the Second Circuit said New York's law is clear.

The other matter relates to Everly Brown. Mr. Brown and 27 other candidates are seeking to be restored to the ballot in Queens County for various public offices and party positions. There was a cover sheet defect, he did not timely commence a judicial proceeding. Supreme Court dismissed the proceeding.

14 The Appellate Division, Second 15 Department yesterday unanimously affirmed that 16 decision after oral argument and literally on the 17 way down here, we received Mr. Brown is seeking 18 leave to appeal to the Court of Appeals. If we 19 are going to oppose that ruling, we have to make 20 our submission by noon tomorrow, and I'm asking 21 that the commissioners authorize the Board to 22 request the Law Department to continue to 23 represent us and oppose the relief sought given 24 the fact that the election is less than a week

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2	away.
3	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: So authorized.
4	SECRETARY UMANE: Second. Anybody
5	object?
6	MR. RYAN: Hearing none
7	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Hearing none
8	MR. RYAN: the motion carries.
9	MR. RICHMAN: Thank you, commissioners.
10	MR. RYAN: That is all that I had for
11	this, unless somebody has anything else.
12	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: I would like to wish
13	all commissioners and all boroughs good luck in
14	the continuation of this early voting and the
15	election day activities.
16	MR. RYAN: Oh, and we did the
17	commissioners attendance and we did not recognize
18	Mr. Denkberg and Mr. Moltner, commissioner's
19	counsel, nor did we recognize ourselves. So I'm
20	Michael Ryan and Dawn Sandow is seated my left
21	and Ms. Kontazmanis is at an undisclosed location
22	within the building. She's the designated
23	survivor. [laughter] And
24	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: Before the

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2	jocularity gets away from us, are there any
3	matters for executive session?
4	MR. RYAN: I don't have any matters for
5	executive session, I don't know if the
6	commissioners. But I also have to recognize
7	general counsel Steve Richman and deputy general
8	counsel Rafael Savino.
9	COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: If you can't
10	recognize them by this time, it's too late.
11	[laughter]
12	MR. RYAN: And then the only thing we
13	would need to do then is to set the next meeting
14	date.
15	SECRETARY UMANE: I move that we adjourn
16	until June 30th, and that we not meet next week
17	because it's election day and that we have our
18	next meeting on June 30th, the following Tuesday
19	at 1:30 p.m.
20	PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Second it.
21	MR. RYAN: Hearing no objections the
22	motion carries.
