MR. RYAN: So, with that, Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir is officially welcomed aboard the Board of Commissioners and I will continue with the balance of the staff roll call. First, we are also joined by commissioners' counsel Steve Denkberg and Kenneth Moltner. As I have stated, I am Michael Ryan, the executive director. Dawn Sandow is appearing remotely and appearing remotely as well are the deputy executive director and administrative manager Pamela Perkins and the operations manager Georgea Kontazmanis. Seated at the table before me is deputy general counsel Rafael Savino. All of that having been said, I'm prepared to move on to the remainder of the agenda, and there will be an Item C, a report on a finance committee meeting that was conducted earlier today and Mr. Suss, who is seated in the audience area will be joined at the table when we get to that matter.

So, moving on, we have some updates for the November 3, 2020 election, which also includes nine days of early voting, which commence this coming Saturday, October 24th and

run for nine consecutive days thereafter.

With respect to the voter registration deadline that passed on October 9th, all voters that wanted to be eligible to vote in the upcoming elections, whether it be at the start of early voting or on election day, had to be registered by October 9th. I am pleased to report that between September 1st and the deadline, the Board of Elections has received and processed 168,860 new voter registrations. So once again, the staff met its legal responsibility and rose to the challenge of the increased number of voter registration applications that we see typically before every general election, but more so of course when where they'll lead up to presidential elections.

So we met the deadline and those voters who submitted their applications should have, and I can tell you this, my middle daughter was one of them, and timely received her acknowledgement notice that she's registered to vote, which prompted her to say to me, what do I do with this. And so I explained it to her and she's

going to vote in this election for the first time. So that's a good thing and I'm sure that there's thousands of proud parents around the City of New York that share a similar experience.

With respect to the absentee ballot process, which is quite substantial, as of close of business yesterday, the Board has received and processed, you ready? 1,006,565 absentee ballot applications, and as of close of business yesterday, there were 8,957 remaining in the queues to be processed. So we have been keeping up with that volume of work in record fashion for this election. And that is, it's not an easy task and the staff should be commended for its work in this regard.

The reports back from the vendors, as of close of business yesterday is that both vendors are up to date with the mailing, that based on the records that we've forwarded to them. So, we're doing our part to ensure that the absentee ballot process goes as smoothly as it can.

Getting on to election day, early voting in particular, commences, as I said, this

Saturday, October 24th. We have 88 sites that are ready and will be opened for the nine days of early voting. As I have said in the past and I want to continue to reiterate, 61 early voting locations in November of '19, 79 early voting locations in June of 2020, 88 early voting locations in November, October into November of 2020, a continued and steady increase in the number of early voting sites to give the voters as many options as they possibly can have to effectively and safely participate in the voting process.

Now, I can't say there are no other jurisdictions that are increasing the numbers of poll sites in this process, but I can tell you we are bucking a serious trend in the opposite direction, and that is also something that I think this board of commissioners should be proud of, taking their leadership on that matter and giving that direction to the staff to continue to move forward with our early voting plans. And it's also something that we should be proud of as a board, that we're providing as many

opportunities for the voters to participate as we can, especially in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic.

So, just as a reminder to anyone that's watching, early voting locations are assigned locations, similar to election day, so the easiest way -- well the easiest way to find out what your early voting location is to have not discarded the annual information notice that we have sent to you and all of that information is printed on that notice, as well as the fast pass tag card that has all of that information.

If for some reason, a voter may have misplaced that document, all that information is available on the website and in the find your poll site application, you can type in your address and it'll tell you exactly where you got to go. So that's a very important reminder for early voting.

And all the 88 sites, just as a matter of perspective, and we are deploying a total number of pieces of equipment of 7,586 individual pieces of equipment which includes 365 scanners,

980 electronic poll books, 490 ballot on demand systems printers, 176 ballot marking devices, 176 supply carts, 1,366 privacy booths, 2,904 chairs and 11,129 tables.

That by itself would be a monumental undertaking and we'll report later on as we get closer to election day, well I guess next week, we'll report on what the equipment deployment will be for the general election. That is all I have for Item A on the agenda item 1A, and unless the commissioners have any questions in that regard, I would like to move on to Item 1B. Yes, Commissioner Taylor, you're muted.

PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Could you just state for the watching citizens what the website address is?

MR. RYAN: Oh, yes. That's very well.

Vote, www.vote.nyc, very easy. The other thing is it's optimized for mobile device use, and it has a significant amount of information and I know that the staff is very proud of the work that they've done with some of the instructional videos that are up there. They're not long in

duration, but they're very informative and to the point if you have questions about filling out your absentee ballot, that video is between 30 and 40 seconds, but it tells you everything you need to know about your absentee ballot application. Most importantly, the don't forget to sign the oath envelope because the signature is the gateway to the ballot whether you're at the poll site, or whether you're voting by absentee, we need your signature in order to verify that you are who you are.

There's that. There's also, you know, videos regarding the efforts that we're making with respect to social distancing and the cleanliness of the poll sites, and that's done all under a button, a couple of buttons down from the top, Vote Safe NYC, and they're good instructional videos.

They show the importance of either your fast pass tag, which you can, as I have done, put on my keychain, so that you can use that barcode to scan in at the poll site, and if you don't want to put it on your keychain or you don't have

a keychain, you can put it in your wallet or your handbag and there's the card that's about the size of a driver's license or other type of credit card or something like that. And it also has the barcode on it, which will scan in the poll pad, and get you right to your voter record, so that you limit the amount of time that you have to interact with the poll workers. The poll workers don't have to worry about spelling of names and things like that and it eliminates errors that might have occurred in the past under those circumstances.

That having been said, it is encouraged that people bring this with them, but it is not mandatory. We would prefer it to happen but if a voter doesn't have it, they can still be looked up using the spelling of their name, or if there's trouble with that, they can go to the address function. There's various ways that it can happen. The quickest way is to use the barcode. The other ways still remain available and videos like that are available on the website for the voters to pay attention to and to have

use of and they've done a great job with it, and it's a consistent theme and messaging that's gone out there.

And my understanding is as well, although I am not Mr. Twitter or Mr. Facebook or anything like that, but I know that there are social media platforms. The links have been shared with elected officials and have been pushed out into the social media platforms as well.

MS. KONTAZMANIS: Mr. Ryan, I'm happy that you mentioned Twitter, can you just repeat the number of absentee applications received and processed? I think it may have gotten mis-Tweeted.

MR. RYAN: 1,006,565. And we have left to process and all of this is as of close of business yesterday, which would be October 19th. We have left to process 8,957. That is always a moving target, but it is a statistically small number in comparison to the overall number received. Ms. Kontazmanis, is there anything further I can do to make your existence on this

2 planet better?

MS. KONTAZMANIS: No, but I appreciate it sir, thank you.

MR. RYAN: Okay. So I'm prepared, unless there's any other questions or statements on 1B, I'm prepared to move on to 1B.

COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: I do have a question very quickly. For some of the polling sites that are in the current, what's currently known as the hot zones in Brooklyn and parts of Queens, are there, if they have not been booked for change, have there been additional safety precautions taken for those areas?

MR. RYAN: Yes, commissioner, and thank you for the question. Unfortunately, and I say that in quotes, we have had to go through this already in June. And in June, COVID-19 was in some respects worst at that time than it is right now and of course you're comparing a bad situation to a worse situation, right. But we developed protocols then with respect to the social distancing, the masks obviously, hand sanitizers, screens, the Plexiglas screens and as

well as engaging with the poll sites that we use and an outside vendor to do a complete sanitizing of the poll sites after each use during the nine days of early voting. So we're doing everything that we can possibly do to make certain that it is as safe and germ free as possible.

In addition, since then, we were previously dispensing antiviral wipes, because that was what we could get on short notice prior to the June election. But since then, the commissioners have approved the purchase of in addition to the antiviral wipes, the commissioners have approved the purchase of hand — ADA compliant hand sanitizing stands with a foot pedal that allows people to access the hand sanitizer by pressing a button the bottom with their foot, so we're going to limit the contact with the device and potential for cross contamination.

The other thing that we've done and this has been previously reported out to the commissioners, but it's also worthy of repeat, prior to the June election, we purchased tempered

glass screens for the poll pads, so that they could be effectively cleaned with alcohol wipes without doing damage to the poll pads themselves because those screens by themselves would be a little bit more sensitive and so the poll workers are also receiving instructions during the training that those poll pads should be wiped down in between each use to further prevent cross contamination.

And, in addition, we have purchased pens that also function as a stylus so that an individual voter will come up to the EDAD table, take their pen, which will have a stylus nub on the end, be able to sign in at the poll pad and then proceed with that pen over to the privacy booth, not have to use the pen that is tethered to the privacy booth and they can use their own pen. This one will have a board logo on it and they can sign, well they signed at the poll pad and then they fill out their ballot at the privacy booth and then they take that individual pen with them when they leave the poll sites, and that's their proof of participation in the

But again, all of these measures were 3 4 taken to promote the social distancing and to do 5 everything that we can to stop the spread of COVID-19 and avoid voter to voter cross 6 7 contamination. 8 PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Thank you, Mr. Ryan. 9 MR. RYAN: Okay. Alright. So, I'm 10 prepared to turn it over momentarily to Mr. 11 Savino to tell us what's what with Item 1B and 12 the request for a petition cover sheet review for 13 the special election currently scheduled for 14 December 22nd in the 12th City Council district 15 in the great county of the Bronx. 16 MR. SAVINO: Hello, commissioners. I'm 17 pleased to report that there is only one 18 defective --19 PRESIDENT TAYLOR: Can't hear you. 20 MR. MR. SHERWIN SUSS: Thank you, thank you Mr. Ryan. Good afternoon, commissioners. There was several items presented to the finance committee this afternoon. The first two items are -- I'm going to group them together because they're similar type items. The first two items are two contracts that deal with fiber communications circuits that are build specifically for the board for use for election night reporting results and these were initially five years ago were bid out, competitively sealed bid and these were built to our specifications and have now been built and now those contracts are up and we are renewing the contracts to provide the monthly service, continue the monthly service to the agencies.

The first cont- and these are the lowest bidders for each of the categories. The first contract was for Optical Communications Group and this to provide eight circuits currently to the various board locations and this is a monthly

contract, so the charge is 36 months times the monthly recurring charge is \$604,800. That's the

recurring charge of \$16,800. It is a 36 month

5 first of the communications networks.

The second is a another group, Stealth Communication Group, I just want to note it was purposely done to do separate communications groups so we don't have all of the agency circuits relying on one vendor in the event that vendor has some difficulty, so we purposely split it up. And the second was Stealth Communications Group. They were also the lowest bid for their circuits. They're providing four circuits at a monthly recurring charge a \$11,462. Again, a 36 month contract times that number equals \$412,632. So the first two items are those communications circuits. Are they any questions regarding those two contracts? Okay. Not hearing any, I'm going to move to --

MR. RYAN: Mr. Suss, we'll save any questions we have. If you could just go through -

MR. RYAN: -- the items and then we'll take [unintelligible] [00:32:36] at the end, thank you.

MR. SUSS: The next three contracts also grouping together therefore are trucking contracts, which we currently use to move or equipment from the voting machine facilities out to the poll sites as needed. These contracts were done prior to early voting and so the moving of the equipment for early voting, as you heard the number of equipment that Mr. Ryan just mentioned was not included when these contracts were originally calculated and so we need to increase the contract ceiling of these to meet the projected needs of the contract.

The trucking contracts will be expiring at the end of this calendar year, and we'll be coming back to the board shortly with some information regarding the trucking contracts. But right now, the request is to increase three of the trucking contracts. The first is Century Moving, which does work in Manhattan, and the request is to increase this amount to \$900,000.

This would include I think some outstanding charges and for continuing this election November and moving forward. The second is for Triple Crown Moving which does moving in Brooklyn and the request is to increase that for \$600,000. The third one is Flatbush Moving and that request is to increase for \$700,000. They provide service for Staten Island.

The last item before the commissioners is a contract with Quality Facility Solutions.

This contract is to provide the early voting cleaning services that were mentioned earlier by Mr. Ryan at all the early voting sites. This service is provided through a DCAS requirements contract. We've used this vendor successfully in the June election for cleaning the early voting sites and election day sites. The quote for cleaning 67 early poll sites every day is \$355,000. And I would just mention the reason it's 67 sites and not 88 sites is the other sites have their own cleaning services and will be billing us for those services separately.

MR. RYAN: Okay. So that concludes all

of the items that were considered by the finance committee, and as it is a committee report, it simply requires a voice vote and no motion and to handle that, I will simply ask if there are any objections. Hearing none --

COMMISSIONER ZACCONE: No objections, just a question about are any of the moving contracts, it sounds like these increases are to get us through the election?

MR. SUSS: Yes.

MR. RYAN: Yes, all of those three contracts are expiring at the end of the year. So this is just to cover the shortfall to get us through, as Mr. Suss had indicated, early voting was not part of the mix when these contracts were let. They were previously three year contracts, Mr. Suss?

MR. SUSS: Four year contracts.

MR. RYAN: Four year contracts, so four years ago, there was no early voting, and now the contracts have topped out and this is what's going to carry us through to the end of the year. If there are no objections, the motion is deemed

Carried unanimously. And now I will ask President Taylor if she would be so inclined to make a motion to go into -- well, so set the meeting for next week, I always forget that first, right. So set the meeting I guess for next week would be the 27th.
