Page 3 1 February 2, 2021 2 (The meeting commenced at 1:37 p.m.) MR. MICHAEL J. RYAN: Yes, today is 3 4 Tuesday, February 2, 2021 and this is the weekly meeting of the Commissioners of Elections. I'm 5 going to remind everyone to mute their 6 7 microphones please. I will start, my name is Michael Ryan, I'm the executive director of the 8 Board of Elections and I will start with the 9 commissioner roll call, President Umane? 10 11 PRESIDENT FREDERIC UMANE: Here. 12 MR. RYAN: Secretary Camilo? 13 SECRETARY MIGUELINA CAMILO: Here. 14 MR. RYAN: Commissioner Araujo? 15 COMMISSIONER JOSE ARAUJO: Present, good afternoon. 16 MR. RYAN: Good afternoon. Commissioner 17 18 Marmorato? 19 COMMISSIONER GINO MARMORATO: Present, 20 good afternoon. 21 MR. RYAN: Good afternoon. Commissioner 22 Michel? Commissioner Michel, I see his name up 23 there. We'll keep going. Commissioner Souvenir, 24 Pepe-Souvenir?

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2	COMMISSIONER MICHAEL MICHEL: This is
3	Commissioner Michel.
4	MR. RYAN: Okay.
5	COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: I'm trying
6	to unmute myself.
7	MR. RYAN: Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir?
8	COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: I'm here,
9	but [unintelligible] [00:08:22] myself.
10	MR. RYAN: Okay. And I got Commissioner
11	Michel as well. Commissioner Shamoun?
12	COMMISSIONER SIMON SHAMOUN: Present,
13	thank you.
14	MR. RYAN: Thank you. Commissioner
15	COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: Present, I
16	couldn't unmute myself, I'm so sorry, good
17	afternoon everyone.
18	MR. RYAN: Okay. No problem
19	commissioner, we did hear you.
20	COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: Oh, okay.
21	MR. RYAN: No problem. Commissioner
22	Taylor? Yes, saw the head nod. Can you unmute
23	Commissioner Taylor please? Alright. So
24	Commissioner

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	Present. There you go. We got you now. Thank you.
4	Commissioner Townsend?
5	COMMISSIONER TIFFANY TOWNSEND: Good
6	afternoon, present.
7	MR. RYAN: Good afternoon. Commissioner
8	Zaccone?
9	COMMISSIONER JOHN WM. ZACCONE: Present,
10	good afternoon.
11	MR. RYAN: Good afternoon. Okay. So that
12	concludes the commissioner roll call. As I said,
13	I'm Michael Ryan. I'm the executive director.
14	Seated next to me, to my left, is Dawn Sandow,
15	the deputy executive director, administrative
16	manager Pamela Perkins and operations manager
17	Georgea Kontazmanis are elsewhere in the
18	building. We have both counsels for the
19	commissioners, Kenneth Moltner and Steven
20	Denkberg, via video. I don't believe that I've
21	left anybody out this week. That's good.
22	So, moving right along, agenda item
23	number one, the deadline for the change of
24	enrollment for the June election is February 14,

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2	2021. That's pursuant to new statute, so any
3	change of enrollment received by the Board up to
4	and including February 14th, shall take effect
5	immediately and change of enrollments received
6	after February 14th and up to, but up to June
7	28th will be effective June 29th. So what we're
8	looking for is for the general office to remain
9	open from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. to accept any
10	changes of enrollment that would be effective
11	immediately up until February 14th. Can I get a
12	motion on that?
13	SECRETARY CAMILO: So moved.
14	Commissioner Umane is on mute.
15	COMMISSIONER TAYLOR: Second it.
16	PRESIDENT UMANE: Second it, I was
17	trying
18	MR. RYAN: Okay. Any objections? Hearing
19	none, the motion carries. So moving on to item
20	number two, as the commissioners are aware, we
21	are presently conducting a special elections in
22	Queens, in the 24th Council District and through
23	the end of the voting day of the nine days of
24	early voting on Sunday, there were 2,039 check-

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ins for early voting. We, despite the inclement 2 weather, the poll sites were open on time and are 3 operational and early reports back are that there 4 were voters at the poll sites early, between 6:00 5 and 6:30 already exercising their right to vote. 6 7 So that's underway and obviously, we'll have more robust reporting after the election, but I did 8 9 want to point out and we will reiterate this 10 again next week. On election night, we will be 11 reporting out the results for this contest by the 12 first choice votes of the candidates. And the 13 round by round selections will be completed 14 during the post election certification process 15 and will be completed after all of the votes have 16 been received and tallied. And that's how we're 17 going to handle it for this go round. And how we 18 handle things moving forward, the way that we're 19 looking at this particular election is conduct, 20 evaluate, improve.

21 And I think that's the mantra for every 22 election, but for this one in particular, we're 23 doing something new. And keep in mind, for 24 special elections and generals as well, we have

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to wait 13 days, the military voters have up to 13 days after the election to submit -- for us to receive their voted absentee ballots by mail. So there's a possibility that there can be a delay of up to as many as 13 days for a number of votes to come in.

8 In addition to that 13 days, assume in 9 the extreme scenario somebody submits their 10 absentee ballot, they send it out timely, we get 11 it 13 days later. If there is a defect, we have 12 to give that voter then, in their executed oath 13 envelope, we have to give that voter another 14 seven days, under the present state of the law, 15 to cure that.

So we have a lot of timeframes built into this process and we will consider this new endeavor as a work in progress and we'll continue to evaluate it as we move along.

20 COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: I have a 21 question. 22 MR. RYAN: Sure.

PRESIDENT UMANE: Also, you should
mention we're going to use -- we're going to

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2	count the votes if necessary, if there's no
3	winner, two ways. Could you go into that?
4	MR. RYAN: Certainly. We have, we had a
5	single response to the RFP that we put out as the
6	ranked-choice resource center. We're going to be
7	using the software that they provide, which is an
8	open source code software, so it's otherwise no
9	cost, except that there is then some cost
10	associated with the technical expertise. So they
11	will assist us in tabulating the votes through
12	the algorithm software and we will also, to
13	ensure that we are meeting the state mandate, we
14	will be also tabulating those votes by hand more
15	or less to check one system against the other.
16	And we're working now closely with the
17	state Board of Elections. There was a recent
18	determination at their meeting last Thursday I

submitted. We've already submitted to them back in December 113-page document regarding the ranked-choice voting resource center, and as

there is a form application that needs to be

believe, by the State Board of Elections to say

that they should assist us in moving forward, and

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well, the software is open source code, so otherwise available, so, but that process is underway. We will be finalizing that paperwork over the next day or so. And then the State Board of Elections will do its work. They also have committed to working with us to formulate the proper procedures and protocols in place for conducting this election moving forward.

10 So those are the two ways that we'll be 11 handling that piece of business. And it's worth 12 nothing that the State of Maine, which also uses 13 the same voting system that we do conducts the 14 elections in the exact same manner, by waiting 15 until all of the votes come in and doing the 16 tabulation one time. And there's other 17 jurisdictions that it differently. Their system 18 is, or at least one other jurisdiction that does 19 it differently. And their system is set up a 20 little bit differently. But we will work with the 21 State Board of Elections to conduct this election 22 in a manner that is consistent with both New York 23 State Law, the city charter, and the capability 24 of the technology that's available to us. And so

COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: This is 6 7 something that is not really related to that. It's related to the comment that you made earlier 8 9 about how many people have voted in the Queens 10 special. How many absentee ballots did we 11 receive? If you know. 12 MR. RYAN: Off the top of my head, I 13 think that there was at least 1,000 applications 14 that were received. But we're going to --15 MS. KONTAZMANIS: Thus far, Mr. Ryan, the number is in the 600s thus far. 16 17 MR. RYAN: That we've got back, or that 18 we've received? 19 MS. KONTAZMANIS: That we've received 20 back, sir. 21 MR. RYAN: Received back. No, I'm sorry, 22 I was talking, Ms. Kontazmanis, about the 23 aggregate number of applications received. 24 MS. KONTAZMANIS: About 2,000.

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2	MR. RYAN: Right, okay. So I knew it was
3	north of 1,000, so about 2,000 applications
4	received, about 600 received back.
5	COMMISSIONER PEPE-SOUVENIR: Thank you.
6	MR. RYAN: And when you consider an
7	election, we don't know what the turnout is going
8	to be today but in a relatively small election,
9	with 600 pieces of paper outstanding, that could
10	certainly have some sway, right. So, anyone else
11	have anything?
12	PRESIDENT UMANE: I would move that we
13	go into executive session for personnel.
14	MR. RYAN: Well, you can unless you want
15	to dispense with item three on the agenda and
16	then item four, the finance committee? We have
17	two more agenda items.
18	PRESIDENT UMANE: I only had two items.
19	MR. RYAN: There was another one sent
20	out. We have the poll worker exceptions that we
21	have to recognize, that were submitted to the
22	Bronx commissioners.
23	MS. DAWN SANDOW: And approved.
24	MR. RYAN: Submitted and approved, I

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2	believe, that need full board approval on, right.
3	SECRETARY CAMILO: Yes.
4	MR. RYAN: So, that would be the special
5	election for the March 23, 2021, which includes
6	Council Districts 11 and 15. So if one of the
7	Bronx commissioners would be kind enough to make
8	a motion and then the other second.
9	SECRETARY CAMILO: I would move to
10	approve the
11	COMMISSIONER MARMORATO: Second.
12	MR. RYAN: Any objections? Hearing none,
13	the motion carries. And then we, commissioner, we
14	did have one add-on, President Umane, which was
15	the finance committee report. So I'm going to
16	call up Mr. Suss to sit at the table and make
17	that presentation.
18	MR. SHERWIN SUSS: Good afternoon,
19	commissioners. There were two items that were
20	presented to the finance committee earlier today.
21	The first item was the Elections Systems &
22	Software, ES&S contract, as of today, yesterday
23	actually, the contract we have normally mirrors
24	the New York State OGS contract. The New York

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2 State OGS contract expired yesterday. I spoke, I personally spoke with the representatives who 3 takes care of that contract, who advised me that 4 5 there is a solicitation pending to have a new contract for these voting machine, voting machine 6 7 systems. They anticipate that that contract, they hope to have it in place by May. The 8 9 recommendation I had made to the commissioners at 10 the finance committee meeting was to have our 11 contract, a temporary contract for one year to 12 allow the Board to function with the continuity, 13 no loss of services and support from ES&S, and 14 during that year, if and when the New York State 15 contract does come into play, we can enter into a 16 more formal contract to mirror the term of that 17 contract.

18 The current contract is based upon the 19 old pricing of the recently expired contract from 20 the OGS. And if in fact, it turns out the new 21 contract has increased in prices, there is a 22 recommendation from the finance committee that we 23 continue to use this contract for the rest of the 24 year, so that the Board can see savings before

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entering into the new contract. So the total contract for the year would be \$7,344,606 and that would be for support for these special elections, for the June election and for the November election. And actually, this represents a reduction from the yearly cost of the previous ES&S contract. We tried to make it as fine as we could with Mr. Norris [phonetic] at the EVS [phonetic] for only what's needed. That was the ES&S contract.

12 MR. RYAN: And just if I may, for the 13 commissioners that are relatively new to the 14 Board and are not as familiar with the history, 15 the first ES&S contract was a five year contract. 16 That expired now like six years ago in 2015. It 17 was replaced with a four year contract and a two 18 year renewal. And the significance of Mr. Suss 19 mentioning OGS, that is the state, New York State 20 Office of General Services. So New York State 21 negotiates the contract and we then piggyback on 22 that contract and essentially, once that contract 23 is in place, all we're doing is engaging in the 24 formal registration of that contract with the

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City of New York under the city procurement rules so that we can generate a payment mechanism. It's not a separately negotiated request for proposals where we're sending out and seeking to choose vendors.

7 These are regulated items that come from the state. We can only operate voting systems as 8 9 determined by New York State. Right now, as it 10 stands, there are two tabulation vendors in New 11 York State. I believe there might be another one 12 pending at some point. But we have the company 13 that we have, and since we're not in a position 14 financially or otherwise to wholesale replace the 15 voting system we have, this will cover the 16 technical expertise and assistance that's 17 required to keep the machines that we presently 18 own operating and functional. Mr. Suss.

PRESIDENT UMANE: So on behalf of the finance committee, we unanimously recommended to the board. And as a committee, you don't need to have a motion and a second because it's a committee report.

MR. RYAN: So, if there are no

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2	objections, that will be adopted, that portion of
3	the committee report will be adopted, and then
4	Mr. Suss, if you can move on to item number two
5	of the committee report.
6	MR. SUSS: The second item is to
7	purchase the stylus pens that we've used for the
8	last November and previous June election to help
9	meet the COVID-19 protocol. You may recall the
10	stylus. We actually give each individual voter
11	their own stylus pen so they could sign the
12	electronic poll book and then take the pen with
13	then and use it to fill out their ballot and put
14	it in the scanner and then they take it with
15	them. And this has been actually lauded as one of
16	the better COVID protocols that we had in place
17	to ensure and stop the spread.
18	This contract is for a company called
19	Evergreen. We've used them before. This is going

Evergreen. We've used them before. This is going to be the same pen that was used in the past November election. It's a New York City requirements contract that we're using. Again, it was negotiated by the city of New York and we're just piggybacking on this contract as well. The

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pen is going to cost us .26 cents a pen, which is 2 actually a two cent reduction from when we 3 4 purchased them back in November. We're requesting 5 two million pens, which is a number that was provided to the procurement department by the 6 7 election day operations unit and the voting equipment operations unit based upon the number 8 9 of registered voters, Democrat and Republican, 10 that are going to be in the June election, and 11 that this is going to be with a mayoral races and 12 all the city council races could be one of the 13 bigger turnouts that we have for primary 14 election. The not to exceed cost of this would be 15 \$520,000. 16 PRESIDENT UMANE: On behalf the finance 17 committee, despite [unintelligible] [00:26:59] 18 objection by one particular member, it was 19

unanimously approved and recommended to the full board.

21 SECRETARY CAMILO: Alright, thank you
 22 Mr. Suss.

23 MR. SUSS: Thank you very much,24 commissioners.

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2	MR. RYAN: Okay. And now Commissioner
3	Umane, you had made the motion earlier to go into
4	executive session, and if I might make one
5	friendly amendment to that to set the next
6	meeting date for next Tuesday, the 9th.
7	PRESIDENT UMANE: At 1:30, yes.
8	MR. RYAN: Yes. Alright. Is there a
9	second?
10	SECRETARY CAMILO: Second.
11	MR. RYAN: Any objections? Hearing none,
12	we are adjourned to executive session.
