MS. SANDOW: -- choice voting. If no candidate receives 50 percent plus one of the vote today in either election, we will conduct the rounds of ranked-choice voting. To do so, all absentees must be received by the board. The last day to receive an absentee ballot is March 30th. The last day to receive a military absentee ballot is April 5th. We have mailed out our absentee ballots as follows. 11th Council District, mailed 4,429 absentee ballots, of which 39 are military, returned ballots as of yesterday is 2,018.

absentee ballots of which 50 are military ballots. Returned ballots as of yesterday was 297. If no additional ballots are received that are cure eligible, this means the earliest we can begin the rounds of ranked-choice voting would be April 7th, as we would need a day or so to conduct the audit. The date will fluctuate as cure eligible invalid ballots are received. We

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will provide an update once again next Tuesday.

Item number three on the agenda, commissioners, we have emailed you a copy of the updated canvas procedures that include ranked-choice voting procedures as well as proposed change in the manual recanvas process. As you remember, in the budget last year, the legislature and governor passed a bill that went into effect January 1st of this year, to wit, a manual recanvas for the state of any election that is within a half a percent or 20 votes, or less than 5,000 for elections over a million votes.

This is a change in our policy and procedures approved by our board in 2001, where we conduct a manual canvas of any election within a half a percent or less than 10 votes, or twotenths with over a million votes. This board has also maintained a policy to not conduct a manual recount for delegates and alternate delegate races, a carve out that the state law does not have. Staff is proposing that we amend our procedures to meet the state standard.

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PRESIDENT UMANE: I think we have no choice, so I would move that we amend our procedures to apply with applicable law.

SECRETARY CAMILO: I would second that.

MS. SANDOW: All in favor?

MULTIPLE: Aye.

MS. SANDOW: Any opposed? Motion moves and adopted. Item four on the agenda is the appointment of the commissioners cover sheet review committee. I'll turn this over to legal, but before I do, I want to remind everyone that petitions are due this week. The last day to file is this Thursday, March 25th. Any filing information including copy requests and public viewing hours can be found on our website at vote.nyc under the box attention petition filers. Legal.

MR. SAVINO: Commissioners, we're asking that cover sheet, commissioners cover sheet review teams be designated. I understand there have been some discussion and maybe some volunteers, but if, we're looking for someone today after the stated public meeting, someone on

[EXECUTIVE SESSION]

MS. SANDOW: Good afternoon, before I close out the meeting with nothing to report from exec session, I would like to just go over agenda item one and two, as we were notified that we — there was no voice, the public could not hear us for those two items. So I'm going to be repeating them again, so the public can hear. Item number one on the agenda on Friday, March 19th at 4:00 p.m., the executive committee, along with the borough commissioners certified the election results for the 31st Council District, declaring Selvena Brooks-Powers the winner. The full board ratified this committee's decision.

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update on the special elections in the Bronx for the 11th and 15th Council Districts. As of noon today, 4,352 voters have voted, including during early voting. We remind everyone that polls are open until 9:00 p.m. and this election is using the new system of ranked-choice voting. If no candidate receives 50 percent plus one of the vote today in either election, we will conduct the rounds of ranked choice voting.

To do so, all absentee ballots must be received by the board. The last day to receive an absentee ballot is March 30th, the last day to receive a military absentee ballot is April 5th.

[COVER SHEET REVIEW]

MS. ZOYA SHPIGELMAN: Good afternoon, commissioners.

MR. RAPHAEL SAVINO: Good afternoon, commissioners. Today is Tuesday, March 23rd, we're having our first cover sheet, commissioners cover sheet review. Joining us remotely is Commissioner Shamoun and Commissioner Townsend. Seated to my right is Zoya Shpigelman and over here, we have Mr. Castorina.

Presenting first will be Zoya, who has a couple of Bronx matters.

MS. SHPIGELMAN: Yes, so the first one I'm presenting is Democratic Party, Volume BX2100129 and BX2100150. And there are two issues, commissioners. The first one is the name on the petition has the middle initial missing,

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that's not on the cover sheet. And as you know, the petition and the cover sheet has to match exactly. And the second issue is the address on the petition does not have the apartment number on the cover sheet. So that also has to match.

As you know, according to our rules, C2-I and C2-B of the designating petition rules for the primary. That is --

MR. SAVINO: The apartment number is recommended but optional. The middle initial, usually if there's something extra on the cover sheet, extra information, we might say it's okay. But on this one, it's got the apartment number on the petition and then not on the cover sheet. But again, it's within your discretion if you decree that these are both defects, or one or the other.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Are they curable defects?

MR. SAVINO: Yes. They can fix the apartment number issue and then they can fix --

MS. SHPIGELMAN: -- the middle initial.

MR. SAVINO: Right, the middle initial within three days with an amended cover sheet.

3	in the past?
4	MR. SAVINO: I've seen the middle
5	initial go both ways, but the address, yeah, I
6	mean
7	MS. SHPIGELMAN: The apartment number is
8	optional.

10	is, you know, again optional but recommended. Our
11	rules do say that it's supposed to match, but I
12	have seen some rulings where they didn't feel the
13	middle initial was an issue. I don't recall the
14	apartment number. I think that might have been
15	ruled a defect more often than not.
16	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Commissioner, do
17	you have a
18	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I'm, sorry, this
19	is, it just comes a little turned. Excuse me,
20	never mind. I don't have an issue with the
21	apartment number, given that it's optional.
22	MR. SAVINO: Okay.
23	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I'm fine with
24	letting it remain.

3	MR. SAVINO: And then the other issue
4	so we're saying not both? I think Commissioner
5	Shamoun just agreed I believe.
6	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yes.

8	MR. SAVINO: So the apartment number is
9	not a defect. What about the middle initial?
10	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: The middle
11	initial, you've said we've gone either way and
12	it's something that's easily, if it's curable,
13	I'm fine with letting that.
14	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Yeah, let him
15	cure it.
16	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I mean yeah.
17	MR. SAVINO: Okay. We'll be doing
18	a letter on that one. Just to be clear, apartment
19	number 9. Alright, if I may, I'll fill out your
20	initials on the defect sheet and basically show
21	that it was a split decision. One was not a
22	defect and one was.
23	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Alright. Thank
24	you.

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2	MS. SHPIGELMAN: Okay. If I have your
3	permission, I'll talk about the second. So this
4	one is Democratic Party. The petition,
5	identification number is BX2100154. The
6	candidate's name is Victor Pichardo. He's a
7	delegate to the 12th Judicial Convention in the
8	56th Assembly District. Here, commissioners, the
9	name on the petition, unfortunately does not
10	match the cover sheet, so the name on the cover
11	sheet is Steven Santiano. So that's missing, so
12	as you know the cover sheet and the petition have
13	to match.
14	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: What's your
15	recommendation?
16	MS. SHPIGELMAN: The recommendation is

MS. SHPIGELMAN: The recommendation is that since it does not match, we recommend to rule this as a curable defect.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Fine by me.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yeah, same.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.

MS. SHPIGELMAN: Okay, thank you

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2 MR. SAVINO: Are you -- is that it for 3 you?

MS. SHPIGELMAN: That is it.

MR. SAVINO: Alright. That appears to be it from Ms. Shpigelman, who is doing the Bronx and Staten Island. And next up --

MS. SHPIGELMAN: Thank you, commissioners.

MR. SAVINO: Yeah, come over here.

Alright. So take this one, yes and then go write your letters.

MS. SHPIGELMAN: I will.

MR. SAVINO: Alright, come on down, Mr. Castorino. And I have one that's kind of a megillah, so maybe I'll take a look at that one first. Commissioners, you should have one defect sheet with a whole bunch of writing on it. And hopefully I'll be able to explain that quite clearly. The first, or somewhat clearly. The first issue is, if you see, it's a Republican and it lists a bunch of different ID numbers. If you, you know, for petitions. And if you look at those petitions, I mean I don't know how far you want

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to dig into the petitions, but underneath Solaras [phonetic] and Goldstein, for example, underneath the party position state committee and Republican state committee, on each petition, there's a series of numbers under, underneath that, that really don't explain what they are or what they're there for.

I can maybe speculate or guess. But each one of these petitions underneath, like I said, the cover sheet, underneath the party positions lists a bunch of different numbers. I mean maybe he was trying to say it was the page numbers those candidates appear on, but --

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: And this is which county, I'm sorry. I'm just trying to pull it up.

MR. DANIEL CASTORINO: Queens.

MR. SAVINO: This is Queens.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay, so I'll look at the first one, 57? Which one are you looking at?

MR. SAVINO: It's the, where is the camera? Okay. It's this one with a lot of read writing.

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COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I can't see.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I'm looking at -

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COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Does it have a number? The .PDFs here are numbered.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yeah.

MR. SAVINO: Oh, they are?

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yeah.

MR. SAVINO: Oh, that's great. We'll have to print what we send you next time and then we'll have the numbers. I guess the copying machine did that for us.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Oh.

MR. SAVINO: But the main question on this issue is how far we want to go and look at the petition. Traditionally, we just see if the cover sheet matches, we see if the date of election matches in the top, designating petition, etc. but I mean I've never seen anything like this before. Usually, if somebody only appears on certain pages, usually, they'll reflect that in the cover sheet, and they'll tell you it is. This, as I said, on every petition

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listed up top, 100, 105, 115, 117, 118, 124 and then there's four others, which you were sent, you can see those odd, you know, the numbers on the bottom. So that's one issue. Maybe I'll go on to the next and we can take it from there. That is actually for male state committee, the first one, female Republican state committee, Regina Michelle Landi and James Martinosky, who's the contact person. Daniel Mayo is the contact person. He's done this a few times.

In any event, on the cover sheets for several of the petitions, it does say that the number of signatures required by law is there, which it has to, it has to say that. But for Vanessa Simon, 31st Council, the cover sheet specifically says no representation is made as to sufficient signatures for Vanessa Simon, same thing with Felicia Kalan, at petition NE128. Mr. Mayo, when he wrote the required language about having enough signatures, he wrote next to it, you know, no representation is made as to sufficient signatures for Felicia Kalan, 22nd Council District.

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And, you know, though he does claim sufficient signatures for the others, again, next cover sheet, Felicia Kalan, is that the one, didn't we just do that one? Yeah, Felicia Kalan, Kalan. I'm sorry. Michael Congiliaro. Again, Mr. Mayo, the contact person or whoever drafted this, did say there was the number of petition signatures as required for all the other candidates, but again, they specifically said not for Congiliaro for the 29th Council District. SO I mean it almost seems silly to send him a NCN notice, I think we have to, telling him if he wants to correct that, because I think the answer will be no, or maybe he just won't even reply. But, clearly, if you don't claim sufficient signatures, it's defective.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Yeah.

MR. SAVINO: That is just for those candidates that we spoke of.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: That's fine.

MR. SAVINO: Okay. And we want to leave the numbers alone, or because we're looking too far in the petition? We really don't start

3	that is something we should rule on? I've never
4	seen it before. But as I said, for county
5	committee, you usually put the page number.
6	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Guys, can you
7	hear me?
8	MR. SAVINO: Yes. Can you hear us?
9	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Guys, can you
10	hear me?
11	MR. SAVINO: Can you hear us,
12	commissioners?
13	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I can't hear
14	you. I just lost sound, so I wasn't sure if you
15	could hear me.
16	MR. SAVINO: We can hear you.
17	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay. Now I can
18	hear you.
19	MR. SAVINO: Okay, I moved the mic
20	closer.
21	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: If it doesn't
22	pass the smell test, then that's one thing.
23	MR. SAVINO: Right, that's a bit
24	different, yeah.

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COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: So what's your recommendation on that?

MR. SAVINO: I'm hesitant to start looking too much at the petitions below, in terms of cover sheet review, below the [unintelligible] [01:39:52] and making sure addresses and names match, etc.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.

MR. SAVINO: We've never really gone beyond that. So your ruling would be to go forward where they don't have significant -- the required signatures, they'll get an NCN that he can fix his cover sheet if he wants, and then on the numbers, the weird number listed all over the bottom of the petition, or the middle of the petition, if my understanding of this ruling is correct, that will not be a defect. Alright. Now, let's get a decision on that one too, whatever we do there. What else you got?

MR. CASTORINO: So we're on the reading this number?

MR. SAVINO: Yeah, you could read them, just ending each one and say -- alright, so now

1 March 23, 2021 we've got Democrat QN number ending in 002, for 2 it looks like the 26th Council District. 3 4 MR. CASTORINO: So the zip code on the 5 cover sheet and the zip code on the petition doesn't match. It looks like there's just an 6 7 error on the cover sheet. They put an extra one after the zip code, so it's 111061. And on the 8 9 petition --10 COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Where? Is it the 11 26th Council District? 12 MR. CASTORINO: -- this is, yeah, the 13 26th Council District, of Silkland Al Maurice 14 [phonetic]. 15 COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay. Thank you. 16 MR. CASTORINO: Yeah. And on the petitions, you can see, it's listed 11106, so 17 18 they just added, it looks like an extra 1 on the 19 cover sheet. 20 COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Oh. And what's 21 your recommendation? 22 MR. SAVINO: Well, the zip code has 2.3 consistently been ruled as a defect. But, you 24 know, it's entirely in your discretion. The cover

3	was a defect. That's why they wrote it up.
4	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.
5	MR. SAVINO: I mean it would be hard to
6	serve an objector if you don't have a zip code.
7	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Yeah, send them
8	the notice.
9	MR. SAVINO: I mean the candidate etc.,
10	you know.
11	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.
12	MR. SAVINO: That's why basically one of
13	the reasons it has to be accurate.
14	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.
15	MR. CASTORINO: And your ruling is?
16	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I said it's a
17	defect.
18	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yeah.
19	MR. CASTORINO: Okay, thank you,
20	commissioners. I just wanted to make sure we got
21	that on the record. Alright. On the next
22	petition, it ends in the numbers 975, the name on
23	the petition does not match the name on the cover
24	sheet.

10	Westbrook is on the cover sheet.

13	recommendation is that's a defect. I mean it's
14	two different first names.
15	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yeah.
16	MR. SAVINO: Eva and Pamela aren't even
17	close, but anyway, are they even? I don't know.
18	But
19	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: No, I'm in
20	agreement with that.
21	MR. SAVINO: Okay.
22	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I agree.
23	MR. SAVINO: Okay. Alright. What do you
24	got next?

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MR. CASTORINO: And this is the last
one. This is the Democratic Party. The
identification number ends with 910 to 915 and
this is for a member of the 32nd Council
District. The number of volumes omitted on the
cover sheet.
MR. SAVINO: Right. I mean this one, if
you just look at the cover sheet and you see
total number of volumes, blank dash.
MR. CASTORINO: It's blank.
MR. SAVINO: Yeah, that's a pretty clear
defect in my opinion. You've got to let people
know the number of petitions you have and the
numbers that, the volumes, so people can
potentially object, etc.
COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Right. Okay.
MR. CASTORINO: And the agreement on
that is it's a defect, commissioners?
COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yes.

The first one I have for your review is for Lisa Lashley, which is for petition number KG2100361. This is a Democrat petition for alternate delegate to the Democratic Judicial Convention, Second Judicial District in the 60th Assembly District. Staff identified that the address on the cover sheet does not match the address on the petition. The cover sheet says Sterling Street. The petition says Sterling Place. I don't know if you can tell on the .PDF we sent you, because there's a lot of

3	line down in the second part of the
4	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: What's the name
5	of the what's the name on this? I have names
6	on these .PDFs.
7	MR. CASTORINO: Lisa Lashley.
8	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I'm sorry?
9	MR. CASTORINO: Lisa Lashley.
10	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Okay.
11	MR. CASTORINO: And the address on the
12	cover sheet is listed as 386 Sterling Street, and
13	then on the petition, on five lines down on the
14	alternate delegate section, it is listed as 386
15	Sterling Place. This is a curable defect. Our
16	recommendation would be to send a nonconformance
17	letter and let them attempt to correct it.
18	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I agree.
19	COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.
20	MR. CASTORINO: Okay. As with the other,
21	does our office have the authorization to initial
22	on your behalf on the defect?
23	COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: Thank you.
24	MR. CASTORINO: Okay. The second item I

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have is for Sophia Henry, this is the same petition, KG2100361. This is a Democrat petition for delegate. The Democratic Judicial Convention, Second Judicial District in the 60th Assembly District. Once again, staff identified that the address on the cover sheet does not match the address on the petition. In this instance, on the cover sheet, it is listed as 45 Twin Peaks Drive, P-E-A-K-S. On the petition, and this is on the bottom row of the delegate section, it is listed as 45 Twin Pines Drive, P-I-N-E-S. This is also a curable defect. We would recommend sending a nonconformance letter and giving the candidate an opportunity to correct.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I agree.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Yes.

MR. CASTORINO: The third item I have is for Christopher W. Banks. This is once again the same petition. That is KG2100361. This is a Democratic petition for delegate to Democratic Judicial Convention Second Judicial District 60th Assembly District. Once again, staff identified that the address on the cover sheet does not

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match the address on the petition. In this case, the address is listed as 669 Van Siclen Avenue. If you look, this is, I believe it will be on the third page of your .PDF, because the sample is in the way, we had rescan it. At the top row of the delegate section, this delegate's address is just listed as 669 Van Siclen. In other words, it does not say Van Siclen Avenue. It just says Van Siclen. Staff identified this as a defect. We would recommend that it's the same kind of relief as the other two addresses not matching, sending a nonconformance letter and giving the candidate an opportunity to cure.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.

MR. CASTORINO: Commissioner Shamoun?

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: I agree.

MR. CASTORINO: Thank you. That is the last one I have for that petition. I have two more. This next, the next item I have is for Sabrina Gates. This is petition number KG2100764 and this is a Democratic petition for council member for the 33rd District. Staff identified a discrepancy between the candidate's name. I want

On the cover sheet, the 3 4 candidate is listed as Sabrina Gates, on the 5 petition, the candidate is listed as Sabrina N. Gates. Staff found this to be a defect. I would 6 7 recommend ruling consistently how the commissioners did in the earlier hearing, which I 8 9 wasn't in the room, so I'll be honest, I wasn't 10 sure what that was, but if that's a defect, 11 that's one that can be cured and we can send a 12 letter, and if not, they can just appear on the 13 ballot as Sabrina Gates. 14 COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Wait, I'm sorry. 15 Say that again, the recommendation? 16 MR. CASTORINO: I'm sorry. This is the 17 same issue that I believe occurred earlier, where 18 the candidate's middle initial appears on the 19 petition, but does not appear on the cover sheet. 20 MR. SAVINO: That is correct. And you 21 guys did rule on that as a defect. 22 MR. CASTORINO: So in that instance, we

would ask that you rule in the same way.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN:

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COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: Okay.

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MR. CASTORINO: And we will prepare that letter for you. The final item I have is for Brian W. Kelly. This is petition number KG2100011. This is a Conservative Party petition for delegate to the Second Judicial District convention of the Conservative Party from the 42nd Assembly District. In this instance, the defect identified by staff is that the cover sheet does not indicate that it's a cover sheet. It's basically left to kind of the reader to interpret what it is. Our position would be that that is unduly confusing, but this is something that can be cured by filing an amended cover sheet, which would be our recommendation.

MR. SAVINO: I mean I've never seen it not say cover sheet before, but it's supposed to identify what the document is.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: There's a first thing for everything, you that.

COMMISSIONER SHAMOUN: And it's only our second day doing this.

COMMISSIONER TOWNSEND: I'm sure it will
